FORMING THE COMPARATIVE AND SUPERLATIVE

"er" = more → comparative
"est" = most → superlative

Comparative <u>"er''</u> Big \rightarrow Bigger

Comparative <u>**"more"**</u> Important \rightarrow More important Superlative <u>"est"</u> Big → Biggest

Superlative <u>"most"</u> Important \rightarrow Most important

We use "er" for comparative and "est" for superlative (one or two syllables):

- cheap \rightarrow cheaper than \rightarrow the cheapest
- fast \rightarrow faster than \rightarrow the fastest
- large \rightarrow larger than \rightarrow the largest
- lucky \rightarrow luckier than \rightarrow the luckiest
- early \rightarrow earlier than \rightarrow the earliest
- easy \rightarrow easier than \rightarrow the easiest

We use "more" for comparative and "most" for superlative (two syllables or more):

- Intelligent \rightarrow more intelligent than \rightarrow the most intelligent
- Expensive \rightarrow more expensive than \rightarrow the most expensive

One syllable with the spelling **consonant + vowel + consonant (CVC)** double the final consonant:

- fat \rightarrow fatter than \rightarrow the fattest
- big \rightarrow bigger than \rightarrow the biggest
- sad \rightarrow sadder than \rightarrow the saddest

IRREGULAR COMPARATIVES AND SUPERLATIVES

These adjectives have irregular comparative and superlative forms:

- good \rightarrow better than \rightarrow the best
- bad \rightarrow worse than \rightarrow the worst
- far \rightarrow further | farther than \rightarrow the furthest | farthest
